Introduction

Upswing believes in building technology that is accessible to as many users as possible. This means building technology that can adapt to varying accessibility needs as needed by the end user. In this document, you'll be able to see how Upswing measures up to the web accessibility standards set forth by VPAT 2.3 WCAG—the VPAT subsection responsible for web accessibility standards.

Compliance Met

Upswing meets all WCAG 2.1 AA requirements. WCAG 2.1 AA is the level of web accessibility required of higher education institutions. Upswing meets some AAA requirements as defined below.
